FRANCIS YATE INFORMATION:

1581 - Jane was imprisoned in 1580 because of her refusal to attend
services of the Established Church.

1588 – Francis Yate died in prison having been there since 1580 for
recusancy. The Yate family acquired interest in Cowdrey's Manor at
Padworth from his wife.

1588 - By a nuncupative will, Francis bequeathed lands in West Hanney
to brother Edward **Yate** for seven years. All else should continue as in his
agreement with Francis Tregian upon the marriage between Thomas
Yate, his son, and Marie, the eldest daughter of Francis Tregian.

THOMAS YATE INFORMATION:

Bef. 1650 - His political affiliation was as a Royalist.

Probate: 1660 Property: estate (forfeited part in 1650 as Royalist).

1589 March - At the request of his father, married Mary Tregian (poor kinswoman of Queen Elizabeth I). Her father, a very wealthy man by 1560, was penniless after being found guilty of harboring a seminarian Catholic priest in 1577 and refusing the amorous advances of his kinswoman of above. Before dying in Lisbon in 1608 had 18 lawful children (see Dictionary of National Biography, 1st ser. [London, 1872], pp. 64, 135-9, under Tregian, Francis, "Troubles of our Catholic Forefathers Related by Themselves," ed. by John Norris).

1623 - The Visitation of Berkshire for that year listed a second wife, Dorothy, daughter of Nicholas Stevens of Bouldthorpe, Wiltshire (see The Harleian Society, vol. 56, 1905, p. 150).

1641 - The Lyford churchwardens' "presentments for 1641 state, "...we present Mr. Thomas Yate and his (second) wife for popish recusants."

1650 - Forfeited part of his estates as a Royalist after the family had already suffered imprisonment and fines for their adherence to the Roman Catholic faith refusing to attend the new Church of England in their parish church (see Violet M. Howse, Lyford A Parish Record, 1981).

1654 Will - 7 Aug, proved 1660. Named one grandson, John Yate, as his legatee probably indicating that his sons had preceded him in death. Probate documents in 1658 stated that he had also two minor grandchildren, George Yate and his sister Elizabeth Yate, wards of their mother Elizabeth Yate. This was probably Mary as his other sons were not married to an Elizabeth.

GEORGE JOSEPH YATES INFORMATION:

Death date comes from Calvert Co Newsletter vol VIII no. 8 p 6, where he is referred to as George Yates.

George Yate and Mary, his wife, sold West Falia Plantation on Nov. 20, 1687, Anne Arundel Gentry, Newman St.L.P.L.

George Yate took up a tract called "Padsworth", coming down from "Padsworth House" one of the seats of nobility and gentry in Berkshire. It was willed to his son George, the husband of Richard Warfield's daughter. (The Warfields of Maryland, pp 9 & 10. FGR notes the Warfields as the Duchess of Windsor's Family "...Anne Arundel Co., Md; provincial surveyor of Md., 1662..." CAG v5, Kinnison, Nettie Browning Danforth)

George sold West Falia Plantation on Nov 20 1687, in Anne Arundel Co. In 1662 he was a provincial surveyor of MD. His residence in MD. was The "South River Hundred" in Anne Arundel Co. (Info: "The Warfields Of Maryland" pg 9 & 10)

From M. Lee Minnis: (Yates' researcher)

A George Yates was living with Dr. Michael **Yates** in Caroline Co, VA in a tax list of 1787. Michael paid his tax with one white male at 16-21 years. This leads me to believe that this was George Yates V, nephew of Michael and birth year narrowed to 1768-1771. George went on to live in Culpeper with his four older brothers after Michael died in 1789 and perhaps with Richard. There were two George Yates in the 1810 Census for Culpeper. One was referred to as Capt. George and was most probably George Woodford **Yates** who was a Col. in the War of 1812. His son wrote many years later that the family left Culpeper in 1815 for KY. The other one was listed as George, Sr., and as such would have to have been born prior to 1773 as George Woodford Yates is known to have been born in that year. This George, Sr., was an uncle of George Woodford Yates and not a cousin who a son of Richard would have been and Richard was not to marry until 1778. A George Yates of this age appears in every Census of Culpeper through 1840 where his age listed that year of 60-70 makes his birth year 1770. He is the only George Yates for 1820 and 1840 and in the latter year a John B. **Yates**, a proven son, lives nearby. This is George V who married Mary Wade **Browning**. A look at the family of Richard **Yates** provides corroboration. Richard died testate but the will is missing. His wife is known to have been Mary **Pitt** whom he married in 1778. Collateral evidence shows that William Pitt **Yates** was his son and that he was one of his father's executors in 1815. If Richard had a son George born in 1779 why wasn't he an executor and the inheritor of four slaves in the possession of William Pitt Yates in 1820? If Richard had a son named George,

and one of that name showed up in the 1830 Census of Culpeper, he could have been born no earlier than 1790 and thus could not have been the husband of Mary Wade Browning.

13 March, 1788. Culpeper Co. VA W.B. B 1770-1783 no pp. given [Wulfeck p.70]: Will of George Yates of Culpeper Co. Dated 13 March, 1788. Proven 16 June, 1788. Legatees: Wife Mary Yates, son Lawrence Catlett Yates (minor). His grandfather, George Yates, dec'd., made him a Deed of Gift in Caroline Co. If that land can be recovered by his bro. William Yates and cousin John Yates, it is to be equally divided to son Lawrence Catlett Yates, my brothers and sister, and the children of Uncle George Yates, dec'd. Executors: Bro.-in-law Kemp Catlett, friend David Jameson. Wit.: Sally Catlett, Gabriel Jones, R. Y. Wigginton.

1788. Culpeper Co. VA W.B. C p.291 [A.A. Gentry v.2 p.525]: ". . . whereas my Grandfather George Yates, deceased, did in his lifetime made a special gift for certain land to which he conceived himself entitled which said Deed is recorded in the County of Caroline".

13 Mar 1788. [A.A. Gentry v.2 p.530]: The will of George Yates was probated on 16 Jun 1788.

13 Mar 1788. Culpeper Co. VA D.B. C p.291 [A.A. Gentry v.2 p.530, 536]: He requested that his brother, William Yates and cousin John Yates, "do take all legal methods at the joint expense of all the legatees . . . to recover the same". The land was to be divided equally among his son, Laurence Catlett Yates, his brothers and sister (unnamed) and the children of his uncle George Yates, deceased. He appointed his brother-in-law, Kemp Catlett, and friend, David Jameson, the executors of his estate. George III, while still living, gave his only grandson, George, land. This George was the eldest s/o Dr. Mike, not George 4.

From Early Settlers of Maryland, Gust Skordas, 1968: The following are shown as early settlers. Note: There were generally three types of early settlers; 1. Immigrant (those who paid their own way), 2. Transportee (those whose had their way paid by another-it was common, as a way of encouraging settlement, for the colony to grant land to those who brought others over to the colony-typically those who were brought over then received a grant of their own after some years (usually 7-10) of service to the person who paid their way, and 3. Servant. George Yate (two listings - did he come twice? - also he is not listed in one of the above classes (?perhaps because he came with a government appointment). First listing is for 1670 as a cousin of Jerome White and shows him becoming Deputy Surveyor for Baltimore County in 1672. (Jerome White was at this time, or perhaps a little later, Surveyor General). Second listing shows him in 1680 as Deputy Surveyor of Anne Arundel County. I would speculate that perhaps he finished the period of his first appointment, returned to England, and then came back in 1680.

Others Listed: John Yate (transported 1674), Francis Yates (transported 1664), Henry Yates (transported 1675), Humphrey Yates (transported 1671), John Yates (servant 1673, St. Mary's County), John Yates (transported 1680), Ralph Yates (transported 1665), Richard (transported 1662 with wife), William (transported 1668), and Francis (transported 1662).

From Settlers of Maryland, 1668-1700, Peter Wilson Coldham, 1995: This book shows George Yate(s), Deputy Surveyor for Anne Arundel County, acquiring 10 parcels of land, ranging from 48 to 770 acres, in Baltimore, Anne Arundel, and Calvert counties between the years 1680 and 1686. (It would appear he took advantage of his position to look out for some land for himself.)

From Maryland Genealogies: Shows George Yate, Deputy Surveyor Anne Arundel County, assigning 300 acres (part of his grant of 615 acres) to John and William Cromwell on 12-16-1670. He had been granted it on 12-12-1670. (This appear to conflict somewhat with him not becoming Deputy Surveyor of Anne Arundel County until 1680 - also this parcel does not appear to be in those reference above.)

From Maryland Calendar of Wills: Vol. II - Joseph Yate, Anne Arundel County, 6th June, 1621/11th Nov., ----: This is very probably a son of George Yate as it wills lands named "Yate's Forbearance", "The Range", "Charley" (this one is listed as Cheveny in reference above-same amount of acreage so one is misspelled or miscopied) and "Padworth Farm" (in addition to other lands). These were among the Lands acquired by George in 1683, 1684, 1683 and 1680, respectively. Children: George, John, Ann (evidently under the age of 16), and Elizabeth (evidently married to a Plummer). Wife: Mary. Vol II - Mary Yate, Anne Arundel County, 20th Mch., 1699. This is the wife of Joseph above. Shows children: Thomas Stockett (?from a previous marriage), Frances, wife of Marein Duvall (? from a previous marriage since she was not listed in Joseph's will), Elizabeth, wife of Thomas Plummer, George, John. Ann from above is not listed (perhaps she is deceased). Vol IV - George Yeate, Baltimore County, 13th Sept.,

1717/18th Nov. 1717. This appears to be the son of Joseph above. It references the land "Forbearance" left to George and his brother John. Children (all under the of 21 evidently): George, Joshua, Samuel, Benjamin, Eleanor, Mary and Rachel. Wife is listed as heir but it does not give her name. Also references a brother John and his wife Elizabeth.

The Yate family of Anne Arundel County, MD, began with George Yate, Gent., who settled there on or before 1664. He was a scion of an armorial family of Great Britain, which is proved by the fact that he willed to his eldest son "my silver seal with my Coat of Arms Ingraven thereon," (Wills, Liber 2, folio 228, Hall of Records, Annapolis). Unfortunately the original will has not been preserved to ascertain if he placed in wax his arms beside his signature - a custom of the early Maryland gentry. Nor have any known private documents come down to the present generation with the seal to establish which branch of the English or Irish Yate families he belonged. Furthermore, no old silver has been found by the family displaying the crest or the arms. It was probably a goat's head of some form as that was the most common for the name Yate, particularly in Berkshire (Fairbairn's Book of Crests).

It is generally accepted, however that he was of the English branch, in as much as he was a "cousin" of Jerome Whyte, Esq., one time Surveyor General of the Province and Deputy Governor. During a controversy over a land survey of George Saughier, Gent., Jerome Whyte stated on Mar 13, 1670/1, the land be laid out by my cousin George Yate, who is best informed of the situation thereof." (Land Office, Liber 12, Folio 5589, Annapolis). George Yate was always styled "Gent," and was educated, being well versed in mathematics for he was His Lordship's Deputy Surveyor with Anne Arundel County as his district. He always signed his name George Yate without the s --the latter being added by later generations.

The earliest reference found for George Yate was on 2 Mar 1664/5, when he was serving on the jury of the Province Court. (Archives of Maryland, Vol. 49, p. 393). No record as been found for his original application for land. The next record of George Yate is on 4 Nov 1665, when he conveyed to Daniel Johnson, of Anne Arundel County, the plantation known as "Great Brushy Neck" lying between the Severn River and Magothy Bay consisting of 150 acres of land. The deed was signed as George Yate, with Abell Browne and Abraham Child as witnesses. No wife waived dower. (A.A. Deeds, Liber IH no.2 Folio 240, Hall of Records, Annapolis).

It is therefore shown that George Yate was in the Province at a sufficient date prior to 2 Mar 1665 to qualify as a juryman, and by Nov 1665 had purchased land, holding it for a time and conveying it to another party. Unfortunately all recorded deeds in Anne Arundel Co., were destroyed by fire in or about 1712, but the above named deed was brought to the Clerk of the Court by John Summerland (Sunderland) who was then seized of the plantation and requested that the deed be duly recorded.

It was not so long after settlement in Maryland that George Yate became actively engaged in public service. At the session of the General Assembly held at St. Mary's City during April-May 1669, George Yate of A. A. Co., was voted 7,200 lbs., of tobacco for service performed during that year. (Archives of Maryland, Vol. 2, p. 228).

He participated in the punitive expedition against the Nanticoke Indians of the Eastern Shore, and for his service he received by vote of the General Assembly in November 1678, 40 lbs of tobacco. (Archives of Maryland, Vol. 7, p.96). By this small amount of tobacco, it is believed that he served in a minor capacity and not as a commissioned officer. This fact somewhat disproves the tradition in one branch of the family that he was formerly an officer in the English Army, and was retired through the loss of an arm in the service. Furthermore, in as much as military titles were used quite frequently in those days, it is believed that if he were a retired English Officer, he would have been referred to or styled with his military title. His most honorable public service, however, seems to be that of Deputy Surveyor of Anne Arundel County, the earliest record of his service in this capacity being 17 May 17 1670. He served continuously until 1684, when he became incapacitated through lameness.

At a meeting of the Privy Council held on 22 Nov 1671, it was shown that "George Yate, Deputy Surveyor in Anne Arundel County" in a survey for John Fowellton on 17 May 1670 had inadvertently given a bound

oak on the land of Gabriel Scott as a land mark instead of Gabriel Parrott. (Archives of Maryland, Vol..5., p., 99. The following appears under his signature. (Chancery Court Proceedings, Liber CD, folio 230, Land Office, Annapolis). "To the Right Honorable the Lord Proprietor of Maryland and Avalon: Lord Baron of Baltimore & c, 15 Mar 1678/9. By virtue of a Special Warrant bearing a date of the twentieth day of Feb., 1677 that I, George Yate, Deputy Surveyor under Baker Brooke, Esq., Surveyor General, have laid out and resurveyed for William Hunt a parcel of land called Maidstone afterward possessed and held of one William Crosley for 350 acres of land as it appears. Beginneth and now laid out for 450 acres of land more or less To be held of the Manor of Ann Arundel. Signed, George Yate, Deputy Surveyor." George continued as Deputy Surveyor under Vincent Lowe until 26 Jun 1684 when he was declared incapable to officiate as Deputy Surveyor because of lameness and other problems. (Archives of Maryland, Vol. 51, p. 227).

1679 - May 13, Geo. Yates sold tract of land "Holland Range," owner in 1702 was Anthony of Herring Creek, Anne Arundel Co.

On August 9, 1681, George Yate of Anne Arundel County, Gent., conveyed to Robert Hooper, of the same County, Cooper, "Betty's Choice", of 450 acres lying in Baltimore County, adjoining to the lands of Colonel George Wells, Called "Benjamin's Choice", bordering White Marsh and Cranberry Swamp, for a consideration of 6000 pounds of tobacco together with all buildings and improvements. The conveyance was signed by George Yate while Mary Yate, his wife, waived her dower rights. The witnesses were Henry Hanslap, Mathias Prosper and Mark Richardson.(Baltimore County deeds, Liber R W #--, folio 80)

At the same time there was recorded in Baltimore County the following: (Baltimore County Deeds, Liber R M, Hs, folio 82). "I George Yale of Anne Arundel County in the province of Maryland, Gent., am held and firmly bound unto Robert Hooper of Anne Arundel county, Cooper, for 1200 pounds of tobacco....".

On February 6, 1682/3, George Yate, of Anne Arundel County, Gent., conveyed for a consideration of 3500 pounds of tobacco to George Hope, of this county, Planter, the 250 acres tract "Denchworth" lying at Curtin Creek on the south side of the Patapsco River bounding on Shore Branch and Spring Branch, and adjoining the land formerly held by Quinton Barker (Parker) and now in the possession of William Slade, the same tract "Denchworth", having been patented by George Yate on July 18, 1679. Thomas Bland and Henry Hanslap were witnesses to the transaction. George Yate consented to the sale, while his wife Mary Yate, waived dower before Thomas Taylor, Esq., and William Burgess, Esq., two justices of the Provincial Court.

The bond was dated February 6, 1692/3 by which George Yate obligated himself to George Hope, Planter, for 7000 pounds of tobacco as security for the performances of covenants in deed of the same date. The witnesses were Thomas Taylor, William Burgess, Thomas Bland and Henry Hanslap. (Baltimore County Deeds Liber RM H5 folio 82.)

Perhaps the most significant grant to George Yate was "Yate's Forebearance" which was granted to him by virtue of a warrant dated July 17, 1683, for 500 acres. The survey was made by Thomas Lightfoot, Deputy Surveyor, under Vincent Lowe, the Surveyor General, for 140 acres known as "Yate's Forebearance", lying in Baltimore County, near the main falls of the Patapsco adjoining the lands laid out for John Perss. (Land Office Liber 22, folio 3)

On September 3, 1684, George Yate, Gent., and Mary his wife, conveyed to Thomas Lightfoot, of Baltimore County, Gent., for a valuable consideration (unnamed) and "for diver other good consideration them thereunto moving" the tract "Stopping", lying in Baltimore County between the lands of Captain Thomas Stockett on Bourn Branch adjoining "Hamers Towne", The deed was signed by George Yate, while his wife, Mary Yate, waived her third. The single witness was Henry Bonner. (Baltimore County deeds, Liber R M # HS, folio 140).

On December 3, 1684, George Yate, Gent., received from Thomas Lightfoot, Gent., for an unnamed valuable consideration land in Baltimore County lying on the west side of the Susquahanah River about one mile from the River side being a portion of the tract surveyed for Lightfoot for 760 acres, adjoining "Stockett's Choice" and "Bedell's Choice" Pasture, with all dwelling houses and improvements. No wife of Thomas Lightfoot waived dower, but the witness was Henry Bonner. (Baltimore County Deeds, Liber H M # Hs, folio 117.

On July 9. 1689, George Yate, Gent., sold to Thomas Hooker, Planter of Anne Arundel County, "Mascall Nest", lying in Anne Arundel County on the west side of Patapaco River and on the west side

of the Land of Orphan's Kinseys, containing 230 acres. The deed further stated that George Yate had received grant to this land from the Lord Proprietor in June 1680. George Yate signed the deed, while his wife Mary, waived dower. The witnesses were Richard Hanslap, James Kilis, and John Elsey. (Balt. Co. Deeds, Liber R M #H3, folio 310.)

George Yate was one of the largest patentees of land in the Province during the late seventeenth century, and before his death had acquired a landed estate exceeding several thousands of acres. The following shows a complete list of his patents together with the year of survey, the acreage, locations and the British place name, if any:

Yate's Inheritance on the south side of the Patapsco became the seat of his descendants. Yate's Forbearance near the main falls of the Patapsco also involved his descendants.

The first evidence that George had a wife was on 9 Aug 1781 when Mary Yate waived her dower rights at the sale of "Betty's Choyce." Similar waivers were made on 6 Feb 1682/3 at the sale of "Denchworth"; on 3 Dec 1684, "Stopling"; and 9 Jul 1689, Mascall Rest. George Yate sometime after May 4, 1671, married **Mary, the widow of Thomas Stockett** sometime before June, 1787, and the **daughter of Richard Wells, Gent.** Mary Wells had married sometime before June 1687, on which day Richard Wells, Sr., negotiated his will and bequeathed personalty to his daughter Mary, the wife of Thomas Stockett, (Will, Liber 1, folio 387 Hall of records). Thomas Stockett, of Anne Arundel County, drew up his will on April 23, 1671, and devised his wife Mary his entire estate real and personal during her natural life. Upon her death his son Thomas and an unborn child, if it be a son, were to inherit all realty, while the daughters (unnamed) were to receive the personal estate. A small bequest was left to his cousin Henry White. The instrument was proved at the prerogative Court of Anne Arundel County on May 4, 1671. (Wills, Liber 1, folio 430).

The following is an exact copy of the last will and testament of George Yate. (Wills, Liber 2, folio 228): In the name of God Amen I George Yate of Anne Arundel County in the Province of Maryland being weak in Body but of perfect mind and Memory Praise be God do make and ordaine this my last Will and Testament in form and manner following: First I bequeath my Soul to Almighty and my Body to the Earth to be buried after the discretion of my exec. thereafter named. Item: I give and bequeath unto my son George Yates and John Yates all my seven hundred and seventy acres of land Called Yates His Forbearance lying on the north side of Patapsco River to be equally divided between them the said George Yate and John Yate their heirs and assigns forever. Item: I give and bequeath unto my son John Yate all the remaining part of Padworth Farm in sole to him the said John Yate his heirs and assign for ever and in case of his mortality before he cometh to the age of twenty one years then my

will is that my son George possess the said land to him and his heirs and assign forever. Item: I give and bequeath unto my son George Yate one hundred and forty acres of land called Forbearance lying on the falls of Patapsco River in Baltimore County to him and his the said George Yate his heirs and assigns for ever. Item: I give and bequeath unto my son George Yate my silver Seal Ring with my coat of Arms engraven thereon. Item: I give and bequeath unto my daughter Anne Yate all my three hundred and sixty acres of Land Called Charley lying in the north east branch in Baltimore County to her heirs and assigns forever, and in case of her mortality before marriage then my will is that the same be equally divided between my two sons George Yate and John Yate to them and their heirs and assigns forever. Item: I give unto my daughter (step) Elizabeth Plummer my two hundred acres of land being part unsold of Eight hundred acres of land called Rich Lovell and also my one hundred and eighteen acres called Lovell addition both parcels lying in Baltimore County which said land I give and bequeath unto my said Daughter Elizabeth her heirs and assigns forever. Item: I give and bequeath unto my Dear Loving Wife Mary Yate my two hundred acres of land called the Range lying in Anne Arundel County to her the said Mary Yate and her assigns forever. Like wise I give and bequeath unto my wife Mary Yate my eighty and three acres of Land Called Hogg Harbour lying on the north branch of Putuxin River in Anne Arundel county and one other Tract of Land lying on the said Branch Containing one hundred and thirteen acres all which Three Tracts of land I give unto my said wife Mary Yate and her assigns for ever. Item: I give and bequeath unto my Dear Loving Wife all my whole Personal Estate Only five pounds except Sterling money of England the Which I bequeath unto my Daughter Ann Yate, which my will is that she be paid at the Day of Marriage or at the age of Sixteen Years. All the remainder of my personal Estate I give unto my said Wife Mary Yate forever. Item: I Constitute Ordain and appoint my dear Wife Mary Yate Sole Executor of this my last will and Testament in Witness whereof I do hereto Set my hand & Seal this Sixth day of June in the Year of our Lord one Thousand six hundred Ninety and One.

In seeking the origin of George's ancestry in England, both Newman in his works and John G. Hunt, "English Ancestry of George Yate (ca. 1640-1691) of Maryland," National Genealogical Society Quarterly 64 (September 1976) : 3, point to the five above named plantations with like names in Berkshire, ENG. This was not a common practice but other examples are known (see Ref. 6 to Hunt's article). All five were connected to a Yate family of recusants (Roman Catholics) who were under fire from the crown and the accepted Anglican Church. George seems to fit as a son of John Yate of Lyford, Berkshire, and Mary daughter of George Tattershall of Finchampstead, Berkshire. No will survives for John Yate and that of his father, dated 7 Aug 1654 and proved in 1660, names only one grandson, John Yate. The probate file as appended shows that in 1658 the testator had also two minor grandchildren, George Yate and sister Elizabeth Yate, both wards of their mother Elizabeth Yate (see Great Britain, Calendar of the Proceedings of the Committee for Compounding, &c. [with Delinquents], 1643-1660 [London,1891], 1660, p. 304). The Tattershall pedigree states that George and Elizabeth Tattershall's daughter Mary was the wife of John Yate of Lyford. These were all recusants and it was not uncommon to take an alias to cover Roman Catholic names. Elizabeth was certainly more protective than Mary. George's uncle, Thomas Yate, at Douay in 1629, used a changed surname: "Thomas Yate, alias Stephens, aged 15, of Catholic parents, and born in Lyford in Berkshire," was accepted into that community. Thomas was using the maiden name of his mother. This George is our ancestor with little doubt who, not inheriting the estate, fled to Maryland to escape persecution and to build a new life. His youth was probably spent at Ufton Court, the home of his mother's father's maternal ancestors, as Lyford, his paternal home, was mostly in other hands as early as 1641 (see P.C.C., 3:2327-7).

GEORGE YATES AND RICHARD WARFIELD INFORMATION:

Captain Richard Warfield was the progenitor of the Warfield family in America and one of the first white men to settle in what is now Baltimore County Maryland. He migrated there from his home in County Berkshire, England, in an area that is very near Windsor Castle, just north of London.,

C.) Anne Arundel Gentry, Volume I, (1933) Harry Wright Newman, page 530, confirms parentage, along with acknowledging the date of George Yate II's birth and death, as well as his marriage to Rachel Warfield, daughter of Captain Richard Warfield, and his wife, Elinor "Ellen" [Browne], Warfield. Also included is a documented genealogy of the Maryland Yates family, beginning on page 528

D.) Anne Arundel Gentry, Volume II, (1971) Harry Wright Newman, pp 517-542, shows an extended genealogy of the Yates family, further confirming the information given above and complimenting Volume I, of the same name and author.

E.) Shirley News Letter, July 1979, page 12, confirms birth and death dates for George Yate II, and further confirms the marriage of George Yate II and Rachel Warfield, acknowledging Rachel Warfield as the daughter of Captain Richard Warfield.

George Yate, the eldest son and heir of George Yale, Gent., and Mary Wells, his wife, was born presumably at the dwelling plantation of his father in Anne Arundel County, perhaps about 1674. His share of his father's estate, according to the will of 1691, consisted of one-half of the 700 acres tract of "Yate His Forebearance", lying on the north shore of the Patapsco River in Baltimore County as well as the entire tract "Forebearance" of 140 acres lying in the falls of the Patapsco on the south bank, then in Baltimore County and now in Howard.

On May 8, 1705, by virtue of a warrant from the Lord Proprietary "George Yate, of Baltimore County", was granted 400 acres of land which had been renewable on February 29, 1704/5. The certificate read... these are therefore to certify that by appointment of Clement Hill, Jr., Surveyor General of the Western Shore... have laid out at the head of the Patapsco River..... a tract of land for George Yate known as "Yate's Contrivance." (Patents, Liber C D, folio 276, Land Office, Annapolis.)

George Yate lived on "Yate His Forebearance" before he patented " Yate's Contrivance" but we do know that the latter became his dwelling plantation and was his residence at the time of his death some years later. Besides being a planter in the very productive and affluent section of Elk Ridge, he operated a brick yard with his friend Edward Teall.

About 1700 George Yate married Rachel, fifth child of Captain Richard Warfield, Sr., an outstanding subject of Anne Arundel County. By his will dated January 10, 1703/4, and proved in Anne Arundel County on February 11, 1703/4, he devised to his daughter Rachel in fee simple a 150 acre portion of "Warfield Range", but in the event of her death without issue, it was to revert to the testator's son, Richard Warfield II. In another portion of the will he bequeathed to his daughter Rachel Yate, or to her children at the age of twenty-one years, certain articles of personal property. (Wills, Liber 11, folio 409. Hall of Records.)

In an account upon the estate of Richard Warfield, Sr., rendered by his executors, John Warfield and Richard Warfield accounted for the following disbursement "Of cash paid to George Yate of a portion of the deceased's estate due to Rachel his wife another heir of the accounts as per receipt appears L 4/2-". Thus the marriage of George Yate and Rachel is proved absolutely. (Inventory and Accounts, Liber 25, folio 163, Hall of Records.)

On July 5, 1712, George Yate, of Baltimore County, Planter, conveyed to John Yernel, of the same county, Planter, his portion of "Yate His Forebearance", that is, 382 acres, which he had inherited by the will of his parent. No wife waived dower. (Baltimore County Deeds, Liber R R #A, folio 208.)

It was stated, though without documentary proof, that his wife Rachel died during the year 1709. From the above conveyance, however, it is evident that she had departed by 1712. He married secondly Ruth ? who survived him.

The will of George Yate (sic) was dated September 13, 1717, and proved in Baltimore County on November 18, 1717, by William Hamilton, Samuel Tayier and Joseph Harp. (Wills, Liber 14, folio 340). He devised his four sons: George, Joshua, Samuel and Benjamin and their heirs the dwelling-plantation "Yate Contrivance", the equal divisions were to be made by John Warfield and Richard Warfield when the eldest son, George, attained the age of twenty-one years. Futhermore, the eldest son was to have the first choice of the divisions, but in the event that any of his sons died before they reached the age of twenty-one, the divisions was to be made among the survivors. Personalty was left to his son George, daughter Eleanor, and his brother John Yeats and the latter's wife Elizabeth. His friend Edward Teal was bequeathed certain articles of personalty and one-half of the production from the brickyard until his eldest son came of age. Edward Teall futhermore was "to have oversight of the plantation" and to sell the tract "Forebearance".

He bequeathed his wife (unnamed) L 5 and named her executrix with Edward Teall. The residue of the personal estate was to be divided equally among his four named sons and three daughters - Eleanor, Mary and Rachel. Somehow Edward Teall did not administer the estate jointly with the widow. The will was exhibited before the Deputy Commissary of Baltimore County for the Prerogatives Court during the February session of 1717/18, (Testamentary Proceedings. Liber 23, folio 175 Hall of Records.)

The inventory of the personal estate was made on June 10, 1718, by Christopher Randall and William Hamilton and displayed an appraisal of L 75/11/9. John Outerlong and John Israel signed as the greatest creditors, while John Yate signed as kinsman, that is, John Yate brother to the decd George Yate and satisfied with this appraisalment." (inventory Liber 1, folio 27.) The inventory was presented at court and passed by the Deputy Commissary on July 9, 1718, (Testamentary Proceedings, Liber 23, folio 211.)

His Widow Ruth Yate soon married Joseph Ary and with him became exdcutor of the estate. On September 1, 1726, at the request of John Hall, Esq., the sheriff of Baltimore County, issued citation against Joseph Ary and Ruth his wife "executors of George Yate late of Baltimore county, decd, to show cause why they had not passed an account." (Testamentary Proceedings, Liber 27, folio 33.)

Citations were again issued at the November Court in 1726, at the Jauruary Court of 1726/7, and again during March following: (Testamentary Proceedings, Liber 27, folio 336, 370, 387.) From the records it is shown that the widow and her husband thus defied the court and failed to file an account. The step-mother and her husband became guardians of the minor children, and it can be expected that they dissipated the estate of their wards. Perhaps at this time, 1727, then years after the death of George Yate, there were no proceeds left of the personal estate. However, about this time the elder children were of age and were claiming their share of the real property.

Benjamin Yates, a soldier of the Revolutionary War, died in Manchester, OH on 30 Jan 1849, and is buried in the old graveyard there. He is said to have been over one hundred and four years old when he died. He came from Meadville PA. He had no descendants living, nearer than great-grandchildren. He enlisted Mar 1778 for one year as a private in Captain Pichett's company, from Maryland, colonel not stated. He re-enlisted May 1781 in Captain Murdock's company; colonel not stated. He was wounded at the battle of Yorktown by a piece of shell. He resided in Frederick County, MD when he enlisted. He applied for a pension 10 May 1834, at which time he was eighty-eight years of age. His claim was allowed. He died 30 Jan 1849, leaving a widow, Sarah Robinson, whom he married 16 Jul 1835. She obtained a pension as his widow. The marriage date in this article may be wrong.

According to Gloria Bouaoun, on rootsweb.com, Benjamin Loyd Yates was known to our family only as "Loyd Yates," and so was very difficult to find in any records for many decades. Like many in our family, he had a first name which he did not use! His granddaughter, Emma Josephine Yates Elrod told Gloria Bouaoun that he "lived to be 104 years old and was never sick a day in his life!" His birth and death dates support his long life. Richard was transported into Maryland about 1659 by John Sison (Sisson). The will of John Sisson was probated 16 Mar 1663/4 and by it he bequeathed his servant-boy, Richard Warfield, to Cornelious Howard. Nothing is known of his English origins.

He completed his indenture by 1669 as he was granted a tract of land that year. His land patents ultimately exceeded 2,000 acres. Richard was a militia officer in the Provisional Forces of Anne Arundel County in 1696 and though his rank was not listed was thought to be a captain. The marriage to Elinor Brown has not been proven.

Maryland Calendar of Wills, Vol. 3, p. 28. Will of Richard Warfield, Anne Arundel Co., will dated January 10, 1703-4, probated Feb. 11, 1703. He listed sons: John, Richard, Alexander, and Benjamin. The daughters were Rachel Yate and Elinor, unmarried at the time and Elinor, daughter of Rachel. To son John and heirs "Warfield Plains", and 180 acres, "Warfield's Forest".

To son Richard and heirs plantation on which he now lives and 50 acres "The Addition" also dwelling plantation at marriage or death of dau. Eleanor. To son Alexander and heirs "Brandy". About 1700 George Yate married Rachel, fifth child of Captain Richard Warfield, Sr., an outstanding subject of Anne Arundel County. By his will dated January 10, 1703/4, and proved in Anne Arundel County on February 11, 1703/4, he devised to his daughter Rachel in fee simple a 150 acre portion of "Warfield Range", but in the event of her death without issue, it was to revert to the testator's son, Richard Warfield II. In another portion of the will he bequeathed to his daughter Rachel Yate, or to her children at the age of twenty-one years, certain articles of personal property. (Wills, Liber 11, folio 409. Hall of Records.)

In an account upon the estate of Richard Warfield, Sr., rendered by his executors, John Warfield and Richard Warfield accounted for the following disbursement "Of cash paid to George Yate of a portion of the deceased's estate due to Rachel his wife another heir of the accounts as per receipt appears L 4/2-". Thus the marriage of George Yate and Rachel is proved absolutely. (Inventory and Accounts, Liber 25, folio 163, Hall of Records.)
